Dear Friends in Christ,

There are certain things that are indicators of the health of a congregation. Attendance at the Divine Services of the congregation is a huge one. Attendance at Bible study is another, of course. There is another phenomenon that, I think, tells a great deal about the spiritual focus and the state of fellowship in our congregation—the attendance of congregational members at the funerals of our members.



At the time of death of a loved one, people are in great need of support and encouragement. It is a time when we especially need to “encourage one another and build one another up” (1 Thessalonians 5:11, ESV). I have the suspicion that most people view the visitation prior to the funeral to be a time to do that, and it certainly is. However, when we look at what truly makes us one—our faith in the Triune God and our life of worship—we must realize that the funeral service is, perhaps, an even more important time to be present for one another.

The funeral service and burial is the final earthly act the congregation does for one of her own. To gather in worship as the body of Christ at the time of the death of one of our fellowship is an act that truly demonstrates our unity in Christ. We gather in the bonds of Christian faith and fellowship to “weep with those who weep” (Romans 12:15, ESV) as we recognize that an essential part of our local body of Christ (see 1 Corinthians 12) has succumb to death, but also to find hope and consolation in the victory over sin and death that is ours through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

The more this is all done together as the body of Christ in this place, the healthier we are as a congregation. Without us gathering together for these worship services at the time of a fellow member’s death, it may be a sign of a lack of, or at best a weakness of, the fellowship within the bonds of our congregation. Maybe it is a sign that we need to strengthen the bonds of true fellowship amongst us—not that which is evidenced by conversing over coffee and cookies or by gathering for recreational activity (although those are helpful, as well), but that which is evidenced and fostered and enriched by a life of worship in regular services as well as funeral services.

Let us pray that God continues to foster and strengthen the bonds of fellowship amongst us through the work of His Holy Spirit as He comes to us through the Word and the Sacraments. May that lead us to recognize the depth and the great blessing in that which makes us one, and especially as we find hope, comfort, and peace in the bonds He has given us.

What is Stewardship?

What is a steward? Most people, when asked this question, will reply: “A manager.” That is correct, but it is only half right. A steward is indeed a manager, but he is a manager of what does not belong to him. Someone else is the owner, and the steward manages the owner’s property on the owner’s behalf.

We are God’s stewards. Our stewardship is that God has made us managers of what belongs to Him. For we have brought nothing into this world, and we can take nothing out of it (1 Tim. 6:7). Everything that we have and everything that we are comes from God’s fatherly Divine goodness and mercy. God is the owner. Not only because, as the Creator, He created all things. But also, as the Redeemer, He has redeemed, that is, purchased and won all things. It all, therefore, belongs to Him.

We are simply managers of everything in this world. Like Joseph in Egypt, we are put in charge of managing what belongs to God. What a privilege. Think about that for a minute. The all-knowing, all-powerful, all-wise God has asked us to manage His possessions on His behalf here on earth. And by doing this, He invites us to take part in the allocation of His good gifts. He wants us to give our input and advise Him in where His gifts are to be used. What a privilege indeed.

What a responsibility. For to whom much is given, much shall be required (Luke 12:48). We are not the owners. And while He puts us as managers, we are still to do with His property what He wants done with it. That means we need to know what His desire and will for His property is.

How do we know this? How can we know the will and mind of God? We find the will of God in the Bible. There God tells us what His will for all His gifts are to be used. He tells us how we are to spend our time and use our talents and treasures. He instructs us in the use of our minds, bodies, and souls.

There is nothing that we have that doesn’t belong to Him. “Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price” (1 Cor. 6:19–20). He informs us of the big picture, the overarching policy, of how we as His stewards – His managers and custodians – of His property are to do the managing.

And that is what stewardship is. It is simply doing what God wants us to do with what He has given us. As St. Paul said: “Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those

who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness” (Rom. 6:13). So, let’s dive into the God’s Word and listen to what the owner desires from His stewards.

To the Church” Sermon Series

Ministry Clarity Process at St. Paul

The Voters’ Assembly of St. Paul voted to engage in the Ministry Clarity program offered by the Lutheran Church Extension Fund. This endeavor will allow us as a congregation to take a look at what the focus of our ministry is and how do we more faithfully fulfilled what the Lord has called us to do in this place. Some initial steps have been taken to carry out this process. We have signed paperwork to commit to the process, and we have assembled a leadership team to head up the effort.

This process will take significant investment from our congregation in a couple resource areas—time and finances. The entire process will take about six months as we collect and analyze data from the congregation. We hope people will fully participate as we endeavor to clarify the focus of our work together. On the financial end, it is a \$6000 commitment from the congregation. Our Voters’ Assembly viewed it as a worthwhile commitment. If members would like to contribute to this endeavor in addition to their regular offering, they may do so. Just notate the donation for “Ministry Clarity.”

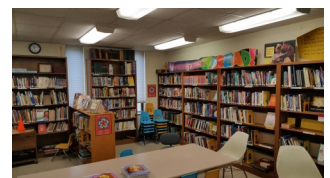

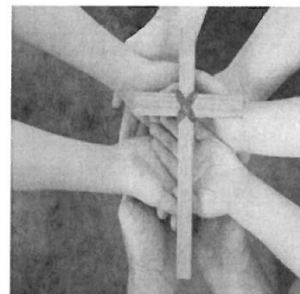

SECURITY FOR LIS: Since 2013, LIS has had the practice of locking all doors during school hours. Visitors are required to enter at the main entrance by the school office, enter through the front door, and be "buzzed in" to the building and report to the office. Individuals who are unable to climb stairs may "buzz in" at the entrance by the preschool or 2nd grade classroom and report to the office.

COMING SOON: Our Parent-Teacher League provided funding for us to put security cameras to monitor our campus 24 hours a day. The wiring has already been completed and the cameras should be installed soon. (Cameras are currently backordered.)
